Readings (we sit)

First Reading: (Lamentations 3.17-26, 31-33)

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Saint Nicholas' Singers sing verses from Psalm 42.1-7

- I. Like as the hart desireth the water-brooks \ast so longeth my soul after thee, O God.
- 2. My soul is athirst for God, yea, even for the living God * when shall I come to appear before the presence of God?
- 3. My tears have been my meat day and night * while they daily say unto me, Where is now thy God?
- 4. Now when I think thereupon, I pour out my heart by myself * for I went with the multitude, and brought them forth into the house of God;
- 5. In the voice of praise and thanksgiving * among such as keep holy-day.
- 6. Why art thou so full of heaviness, O my soul \ast and why art thou so disquieted within me?
- 7. Put thy trust in God * for I will yet give him thanks for the help of his countenance.

Second Reading 'The Bird's Wings' by Rumi (1207-1273) Your grief for what you've lost lifts a mirror up to where you are bravely working.

Commemoration

You are worthy, our Lord and God, to receive glory and honour and power.

For you have created all things, and by your will they have their being.

You are worthy, O Lamb, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed for God saints from every tribe and language and nation.

You have made them to be a kingdom and priests serving our God, and they will reign with you on earth.

Names of the faithful departed are read out and you are invited to come forward and light a candle in their memory.

While the names are read, the Saint Nicholas' Singers sing Psalm 23:

- I. Lord is my shepherd * therefore can I lack nothing.
- 2. He shall feed me in a green pasture * and lead me forth beside the waters of comfort.
- 3. He shall convert my soul * and bring me forth in the paths of righteousness, for his Name's sake.
- 4. Yea, though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil * for thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff comfort me.
- 5. Thou shalt prepare a table before me against them that trouble me * thou hast anointed my head with oil, and my cup shall be full.
- 6. Surely thy loving-kindness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life * and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The Eucharistic Prayer

A prayer is said over the gifts on the altar, to which we respond **Amen.**

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The seasonal part of the prayer follows and at the end the Saint Nicholas' Singers sing:

Holy, Holy, Lord God of hosts. Heav'n and earth are full of your glory. Glory be to thee, O Lord most high. Amen Blessed is he that cometh in the name of the Lord: Hosanna in the highest. [Communion in F major—Harold Darke (188-1976)]

We pray for the Holy Spirit to transform us and the gifts, and then the words of Jesus at the Last Supper are recalled:

The following acclamation is then used:

Great is the mystery of faith:

Christ has died:

Christ is risen:

Christ will come again.

The prayer continues with oblation and intercession, ending:
... all honour and glory be yours, almighty Father, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

Uniting our prayers with the whole company of heaven, let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Jesus is the living bread which came down from heaven: if anyone eats of this bread, they will live for ever.

Lord, give us this bread always.

The Saint Nicholas' Singers sing:

- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.
- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, have mercy on us.
- O Lamb of God, that takest away the sins of the world, grant us thy peace.
