The Collect

First Reading: (Isaiah 61.1-3)

This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

The Saint Nicholas' Singers sings Psalm 121:

- I. I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills * from whence cometh my help.
- 2. My help cometh even from the Lord * who hath made heaven and earth.
- 3. He will not suffer thy foot to be moved \ast and he that keepeth thee will not sleep.
- 4. Behold, he that keepeth Israel * shall neither slumber nor sleep.
- 5. The Lord himself is thy keeper * the Lord is thy defence upon thy right hand;
- 6. So that the sun shall not burn thee by day * neither the moon by night.

The Eucharistic Prayer:

A prayer is said over the gifts on the altar, to which we respond **Amen.**

The Lord be with you and also with you.

Lift up your hearts. We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

The seasonal part of the prayer follows and at the end the Saint Nicholas' Singers sing:

Sanctus, Sanctus, Sanctus, Dominus Deus Sabaoth. Pleni sunt coeli et terra gloria tua. Osanna in excelsis.

[Holy, holy, holy Lord God of Hosts. Heaven and earth are full of thy glory. Hosanna in the highest.]

We pray for the Holy Spirit to transform us and the gifts, and then the words of lesus at the Last Supper are recalled:

The following acclamation is then used:

Praise to you, Lord Jesus:

Dying you destroyed our death, rising you restored our life: Lord Jesus, come in glory.

The prayer continues with oblation and intercession, ending:

... we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:

Blessing and honour and glory and power be yours for ever and ever. Amen.

Let us pray with confidence as our Saviour has taught us:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done; on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Every time we eat this bread and drink this cup, we proclaim the Lord's death until he comes.

The Saint Nicholas' Singers sing:
Agnus Dei, qui tollis peccata mundi, dona eis requiem.

[Lamb of God, who takest away the sins of the world, grant them rest.]

Behold the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world. Blessed are those who are called to his supper. Lord, I am not worthy to receive you, but only say the word, and I shall be healed.

During Communion:

In Paradisum deducant Angeli: in tuo adventu suscipiant te Martyres, et perducant te in civitatem sanctam Jerusalem, Chorus Angelorum te Suscipiant, et cum Lazaro quondam paupere, aeternam habeas requiem. [May the angels lead you into paradise; may the martyrs receive you and lead you to the holy city Jerusalem.]

<u>Post-Communion Prayers: (We stand at 'Let us pray')</u>
After the post-communion prayer we say together

Gracious God, we thank you that in your great love you have fed us with the spiritual food and drink of the body and blood of your Son Jesus Christ and have given us a foretaste of your heavenly banquet: grant that this sacrament may be to us a comfort in affliction and a pledge of our inheritance in that kingdom where there is no death, neither sorrow nor crying, but fullness of joy with all your saints; through Jesus Christ our Saviour.

Final hymn: (we stand)

Praise to the Holiest in the height, And in the depth be praise, In all his words most wonderful, Most sure in all his ways.

O loving wisdom of our God! When all was sin and shame, A second Adam to the fight And to the rescue came.

O wisest love! That flesh and blood, Which did in Adam fail, Should strive afresh against their foe, Should strive and should prevail;

And that a higher gift than grace Should flesh and blood refine, God's presence and his very self, And essence all-divine.

O generous love! That he who smote In Man for man the foe, The double agony in Man For man should undergo;

And in the garden secretly, And on the cross on high, Should teach his brethren, and inspire To suffer and to die.
